## COUNCIL RECEIVES \$64,000 RESEARCH GRANT

The Council was awarded over \$64,000 by the Minnesota Department of Agriculture's Crop Research Grant Program to study *Improving Canola Yields and Quality Through Best Management Practices for Disease*. Madeleine Smith of the Northwest Research & Outreach Center in Crookston is the principal investigator on this project. Understanding the timing and efficacy of management practices, whether cultural or chemical, is key to effective disease management. Little research has been conducted in the Minnesota growing environment on blackleg infection timing. The project objective is to develop blackleg disease control options and best management practices. By establishing a research infrastructure to examine disease management practices on yield and the impact of these practices, there is a unique opportunity to increase yield and quality stability for farmers, demonstrating canola is a reliable cropping choice in Minnesota.

## 2015 CANOLA PRODUCTION CENTRE (CPC)

The 2015 Canola Production Center (CPC) was on Magnusson Farms northwest of Roseau, MN, with a satellite site on the Peter Grafstrom farm east of Roseau. Trials were spearheaded by Nancy Ehlke, Donn Vellekson, and Dave Grafstrom with the University of Minnesota and included:

- Canola Rotation Trial 8 treatments (32 plots)
- Nitrogen Rate, Source, and Timing Trial 23 treatments (92 plots)
- Intensive vs. Traditional Canola Management Trial 8 treatments (32 plots)
- Seeding Rate Trial 12 Treatments (32 plots)
- Variety & Systems Comparison Trial (27 Varieties)

Small plot canola trials were planted May 22, 2015 (base fertility program of 26-40-40-20s on entire area).

## 2015 SCLEROTINIA RISK IN CANOLA FORECAST PROGRAM

The *Sclerotinia Risk in Canola Forecast Program* continues to be a useful tool to help farmers assess sclerotinia risk. The forecasting program was developed by the North Dakota State University canola pathology program with support from the Sclerotinia Initiative, Northern Canola Growers Association (NCGA), and the Minnesota Canola Council (MCC). While the information is based on extensive research data, it is only intended to serve as a guide. The risk maps and the calculator can be found on the MCC website: www.mncanola.org.

#### JOINT RESEARCH COMMITTEE

MCC and NCGA have a joint research advisory committee to determine the most productive allocation of available research dollars, including North Central Regional NCRP and Sclerotinia Initiative funds. The committee meets annually and includes farmers and industry representation from each state. In addition, the committee includes university representatives from Minnesota, North Dakota, South Dakota, and Wisconsin. Copies of the reports are available through the Council.

## "ADD GOLD TO YOUR ROTATION & WATCH YOUR PROFITS GROW"

Nearly 150 producers, university personnel, and industry representatives attended Add Gold to Your Rotation & Watch Your Profits Grow, the Council's annual meeting in Roseau on December 16. The day included educational sessions focused on new innovations, the safety net available to farmers through



crop insurance and the Farm Bill, 2014 MN CPC research, world market demand for oil, and a summary of the 2014 growing season and the benefits realized by farmers who incorporate canola into their rotation. The educational sessions were followed by a grand

prize giveaway featuring a Polaris 600 Indy SP snowmobile sponsored by Northstar Agri-Industries (won by David Ruud of Palisade, MN). In addition, Bayer CropScience, BrettYoung, CROPLAN, DeKalb, DuPont Pioneer, and Star Specialty Seed each sponsored a giveaway of 20 acres worth of canola seed. ## MCC FIELD DAY & GOLF SCRAMBLE ATTRACTS NEAR RECORD ATTENDANCE

Farmers, industry representatives, and extension personnel came out in droves to participate in the Council's 18th Annual Minnesota Canola Production Centre (CPC) Field Day and Canola Hackers Golf Scramble held in Roseau on July 15. Attendees participated in a morning plot tour, a noon lunch, and an afternoon of friendly competition on the links at Roseau's Oakcrest Country Club.

The 2015 Field Day was held on Magnusson Farms, northwest of Roseau, where farmers gathered to take a closer look at the research trials. CPC Project Manager Donn Vellekson led participants through the 3-acre site which featured these trials: variety and systems comparison; nitrogen rate, source, and timing; intensive vs. traditional canola management; canola row spacing/plant population; and canola/soybean rotation. (The CPC's pre-harvest desiccants/straight harvesting trial was located near Hallock.) The field tour was followed by lunch and the Canola Hackers Golf Scramble (in its 13th year).

A near record number of golfers (96) representing 24 total teams competed for the 1st place prize and the bragging rights of being crowned 2015 Canola Hackers Champions. Winning the \$200 first-place prize for the fourth year in a row was the team of Hagen Farms (Billy Hagen, Steve Czeh, Lee Sorenson, and Randy Wahlstrom). After a tie for second place between Bayer (Jeff Bergh, Nick Lindegard, Cameron Mortenson, and Nick Anderson) and South 89 Seed (Amy Brateng, Tony Brateng, Steve Dahl, and Matt Millner), tournament rules determined the Bayer team would prevail and take home the 2nd place prize. Special prizes were awarded for the longest drive, longest putt, closest to the pin, longest marshmallow drive, and the kid's putt. The afternoon ended in the clubhouse with refreshments, socializing, an awards ceremony, and a pig roast dinner.
